Process and outlook

Purpose

- Long-term planning vision (covers 2024–2044)
- Discussion of transportation issues, goals, and options
- Recommendations based on Island needs and values
- Required of all Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs), including the MVC
- Allows Martha's Vineyard to access state and federal transportation funding

Martha's Vineyard Regional Transportation Plan 2020–2040




July 2019

- Identifies issues and goals
- Covers all modes of transportation
- Recommends projects for state and federal funding
- Funded projects are later included in the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)
- Last updated in 2019

Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)




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May 2022

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- Covers five years (coincides with the Massachusetts five-year capital investment plan)
- Updated every year
- Covers all modes of transportation
- Features detailed five-year budget for funded projects
- Last updated in 2022

Primary objectives in 2019

The overarching goal of this RTP is to establish and maintain a transportation system that is safe, reliable, convenient, accessible, economical, affordable, and consistent with the Vineyard's scenic, historic, and natural resources.

Primary objectives in 2019

- Promote a variety of transportation options that efficiently meet the <u>mobility needs of all</u> of the Island's residents and visitors, using the Vineyard's <u>existing transportation</u> <u>infrastructure</u>.
- Reduce dependence on private automobiles by promoting <u>alternate modes of travel (bus,</u> bicycle, etc.) for both residents and visitors; continue to encourage visitors—especially short-term visitors—to come to the Vineyard without a car.
- Encourage residents and visitors to use <u>public transportation</u>, by continually improving bus and park-and-ride services.
- Improve <u>safety and security</u> for all transportation system users.
- Favor the seamless <u>integration of various transportation systems</u> (physical installations, scheduling, etc.) to increase the efficiency and convenience of alternate modes.
- Ensure that the road network is designed and managed to <u>minimize congestion</u>, <u>pollution</u>, <u>and safety problem</u>s, and to <u>preserve scenic roadside views and the character of rural</u> <u>roads</u>.
- Minimize transportation-related pollution, promote <u>energy conservation and</u> <u>sustainability</u>, and support <u>preservation of natural resources</u>.
- Adequately plan to protect roadways and other infrastructure from <u>sea-level rise</u>, erosion and storm flooding.
- Facilitate <u>ongoing public discussions</u> surrounding long-term transportation planning issues including sea-level rise and population growth.

Primary objectives in 2019

- Address problems at the Island's <u>most congested locations</u>, emphasizing traffic management over major physical modifications—such as new or widened roads, or inappropriate traffic controls—that would degrade the character of the Island.
- Expand and enhance a safe and efficient network of <u>shared-use paths (SUPs)</u>, <u>walking</u> <u>trails</u>, and <u>in-town bicycle and pedestrian accommodations</u>.
- Work with the VTA and others to enhance the transportation options of those with <u>limited mobility (disabled, elderly, young people), and for other disadvantaged</u> <u>populations</u>.
- Integrate infrastructure improvements (particularly harbors and the Airport) with economic development strategies.
- <u>Promote cooperation</u> among the Vineyard's various transportation agencies, the public, and private transportation providers.
- <u>Coordinate regional land-use and transportation planning policies</u>, favoring land-use decisions that reinforce the other objectives such as:
 - Consolidation of mixed-use, pedestrian-friendly village areas within the limits of already developed areas, where daily needs can be met without a car.
 - Outside village areas, development within walking distance of bus stops, and encouragement of general stores to reduce the need for routine trips.

Changes in 2019 update

- Reorganized sections to tell a <u>clearer story</u>
- Focused more on <u>issues</u>, with a clear narrative related to each transportation system
- Included <u>executive summary</u> with graphs highlighting aspects of the plan and project recommendations
- Expanded section on <u>climate change</u> and environmental factors
- Reduced duplication throughout
- Eliminated most references to data more than 10 years old (each of the previous two plans relied largely on the MVC's 2009 Island Plan)
- Incorporated data and trends from the <u>2019 Martha's Vineyard</u> <u>Statistical Profile</u>
- Illustrated trends with better graphs and tables
- Redesigned format using InDesign

Changes in 2023 update

- <u>Updated demographics</u>, including 2020 Census results
- Expanded section on climate change, incorporating the <u>Vineyard Climate Action Plan</u> and updated projections
- Expanded section on <u>Steamship Authority</u>, including finances and alternative propulsion
- New section on <u>vulnerable and minority populations</u>, including elder, disabled, and lower-income residents, and non-native English speakers
 - Highlight elder needs and priorities identified in RTP survey
 - Highlight transportation needs identified in MV Older Adult Survey

Time frame for 2023 update

- May–June: Data collection and public outreach
- June 27: JTC meeting to discuss objectives and proposed actions
- Mid-July: Collect survey results
- July 15-20: Finish draft update
- July 25: Formally submit draft to JTC for public comment
- August: Submit final plan to MPO signatories for approval

Update on Transportation Funding

- MassDot Proposals (due June 23)
 - HAMV Mobility Manager 2024 (80% funding, 20% match) \$100k total
 - HAMV GoGo 2024 (50% funding, 50% match) \$100k total
 - MVC4L Shuttle expenses (50% funding, 50% match) \$40k total
 - Vehicle proposal (next round later this summer/early fall) VTA (possibly)
- Elder Services Title III funding (GoGo)
- HAMV GoGo Fundraiser (June/July 2023)
- Others
